TIP OF THE DAY

Baking Soda?

Eliminate the gaseous side effects of baked beans by adding a dash of baking soda while cooking.

Keep cauliflower white and its odor under control when boiling or steaming by adding I tsp of baking soda to cooking water.

Add a pinch of baking soda to the water when boiling cabbage to tenderize and avoid overcooking.

A pinch of baking soda thrown into potatoes while mashing will make them fluffier.


Test the freshness of baking soda by pouring a small amount of white vinegar or lemon juice over 1/2 tsp of baking soda. If it doesn't actively bubble, it's too old to use.

History in Bear Valley

Ever hear of the town Bear Valley?Yes there was a village that existed near the RCTR Club! From about the mid 1800's till as late as the 1960's people lived passed the entrance road of the club. In fact it was about 2 miles farther west of the camp entrance, just beyond the gates on the "State Game Lands". The village was created to house the workers of the Susquehanna Coal Co. Made up of a dozen primitive homes with no running water. The ruins of the mine still exist today. The mine closed around 1930, but some residents continued to stay for the solitude of mountain living; just like many of members here who come for solitude. These miner families lived a very crude life style.

Not much of the town remains today, even the clearing has grown full of trees. (see the diagram of the town). The old general store owned by Jennie Artz (pictured) sat in the middle of the town until the mid 60's. There was one lonesome man living in the old store around that time; no other buildings. Old foundations remain in the woods on the right side of the left branch of the Y that were still slightly visible in the 90's but

now are covered in ever growing trees and brush. Bear Valley even supported a small one room school house (see the 1916 class photo).





The coal from the mine that supported the small town was transported through a big service tunnel called the Williamstown Tunnel. The tunnel was bored completely through the southern side of the Big Lick Mountain. The tunnel was over a mile long and some of the miners actually walked through it every day to work. On

weekends it was used for recreation. On the southern side stood the town of Williamstown and a huge breaker that processed the coal (see picture of the Williamstown Tunnel). Because



the land is now owned by the State Game Commission, they closed it off the tunnel for safety reasons.



I hope you have enjoyed a bit of the deep history of the lands that you now ride and camp.
